


It is Saturday afternoon and Kaylee walks over to the Food Coop, formerly the Rescue Mission, with her kids to visit their uncle Jamal. He's been living there as part of a food cooperative for the past couple years. Jamal's past work history of small construction jobs had placed him in a good position to help build the member straw bale houses, many of which are currently under construction. The kids, Jerome and Robert, like to play tag football in the Seymour schoolyard lot or a game of hoops with him at the courts at Blodgett. They also regularly help at the school farm and market stand, since they have been gardening since preschool at the Community Kids Daycare and really enjoy it. Robert is completely into the experimental garden that is part of his 6th grade classroom, and Jerome is already wanting to be a chef after many food eat-in events and cooking instruction in the classrooms. Though he is only in 4th grade, he already knows how to cook several dishes, all using the fresh produce grown in the neighborhood, both in home lots and at other local institutions. He also already has a list of chefs he wants to study with when he graduates from high school. Kaylee is happy that her family as well as herself has access to all the fresh produce and fruit that is being cultivated in the westside and throughout Syracuse. The produce section at Nojaim's supermarket has almost doubled and Kaylee goes to their composting site to get organic matter for her own backyard plot. Some years back she had been suffering health problems, including obesity and diabetes. She is finally beginning to lose weight and feel more generally healthy, due to both the exercise the gardening activities provide and the better diet. Lots of people in the neighborhood are excited because large vacant fields at the city's edge will be remediated soon in preparation for planting wheat and corn crops. Community Supported Agriculture farms in the county have come together in the westside in the last

Brown Methodist Church, which Kaylee attends once a week, is growing flower gardens and fruit trees on the premises and have even taken up a neighboring lot. They sell the flowers for wedding ceremonies as well as for memorials and funerals. The gardeners are members of the congregation who have been trained by master gardeners from throughout
